President's Comments

President Shibley congratulated Coventry High School graduates, commenting that he was honored to speak at a very impressive graduation ceremony last week.

He reminded citizens that the annual Our Lady of Czenstochowa Festival will take place on June 26, 27 and 28 this year. This event always provides great food and music.

Approval of Town Council minutes April 30 and May 18, 2015

A motion was made by Councilman McGee seconded by Councilman Laboissonniere to approve minutes. All voted Aye.

A motion was made by Councilman Laboissonniere seconded by Councilwoman Duxbury to move item K. "Proclamations" to the current position on the agenda. All voted Aye.

A motion was made by Councilman Laboissonniere seconded by Councilwoman Duxbury to table items 5 and 6 as there was no one present to accept proclamations. All voted Aye.

A motion was made by Councilman McGee seconded by Councilman Laboissonniere to allow Frank Palin, Chairman of the Coventry Fire District Board, to speak in public comment at this time as he has an 8 p.m. meeting with the Fire District. All voted aye.

Mr. Frank Palin addressed the Town Council, stating that he is speaking tonight with sorrow and anger directed at the Town of Coventry for a lack of action to help the fire district. Public safety is at stake and this is the town's responsibility. The Town Council previously provided a \$300,000 loan to the Central Coventry Fire District, then stopped helping, with the exception of providing free rental space in the annex. The former Council's inaction has cost the citizens of Central Coventry Fire over \$3,000,000 fast approaching \$4,000,000. He referred to Section 3.14 of the Charter, allowing the town to establish a department to provide services to the town's residents, and if the town had done that we probably would have a fire department today.

Coventry Fire District is running out of money fast. Overtime costs are over budget along with other costs. The fire district started the year with over a \$650,000 deficit, which is slowly increasing, and I do not believe we can save the district without a massive influx of cash. RIGL 45-18-1 allows for cities and towns to make appropriations to local fire districts. The district needs approximately \$100,000 a month to stay alive. And the town has established a precedent with the \$300,000 loaned to Central Coventry.

Councilman McGee stated that he is sick and tired of hearing how this is the responsibility of the Town Council. He suggested that Mr. Palin apologizes to each and every taxpayer at the fire district meeting tonight for telling them that he could run a district with \$430,000 less and then come back and ask for more money. That was a total misconception. This did not have to happen the way it did, and the fire district would still be alive if you did not lead a revolt at a public meeting. It is not the responsibility of the Town Council to take care of poor management.

President Shibley announced that the rest of public comment will be at a later time in the meeting; Mr. Palin was allowed to speak early because he has a fire district meeting at 8:00 p.m.

A motion was made by Councilman Laboissonniere seconded by Councilman McGee to return public comment to its original location on the agenda. All voted aye.

### COUNCIL DISTRICT UPDATES

Councilman McGee, District 3, remains concerned about the problems with the Coventry Fire District and getting answers.

Councilwoman Duxbury, District 5, announced that the town now has the ability to send robo calls or text messages of notifications for town meetings. If you would like to participate, there are sign up sheets here tonight which require only your phone number and a list of which meetings you want to be notified of. Your information will not be shared and will be removed if requested.

Councilwoman Carlson, District 1, announced that there will be a ground breaking ceremony in front of the annex for the Coventry Lumber Music Pavillion, located at the new Coventry Art park on Tuesday, July 7 at 10:00 a.m. and everyone is invited.

Councilman Laboissonniere, District 2, is happy to see that we have new paving on Route 117 and is also pleased to have the gazebo and music pavilion going in District 2.

President Shibley, District 4, has received calls and emails about the situation at Anthony Fire Station. I can assure the residents that information will be coming as the details are being worked out as to how this will be managed. Also, on a sad note, Jeff Hakanson, President of the Lake Tiogue Association for many years passed away at the age of 57. He was very dedicated and will be missed.

#### SCHOOL DEPARTMENT REPORT

School Committee Chairwoman Kathy Patenaude reported a summary of reductions and cuts to the school budget since the Financial Town Meeting. In addition the School Committee will meet on Tuesday, June 23 to relinquish care and control of the former Oak Haven school, effective June 30, 2015 with the plan being to give it back to the town. The superintendent search continues and Mr. Michael Convery will serve as the immediate Interim superintendent. The School Committee is in the process of contracting with a professional consultant firm to assist with the recruitment of an interim superintendent and ultimately superintendent of schools.

In referring to the budget, she was happy to report that JROTC has been funded for an additional year. It was not funded at the \$250,000 that was requested in the budget, but there is a very good chance that we would only have one teacher, so we cut the \$250,000 down to \$150,000. However, if we do have someone who applies for that position, will need to find \$100,000.

We have a lot of pressure on us to restore certain things to the budget, so when we went back to the drawing board, we found that we had underestimated some of the health care savings, so we were able to bring back some things with those savings. However, there remains no funding for library periodicals, school furniture, curriculum development, textbooks, additional software licenses, storage space or the RTI position. In addition plowing this winter will be difficult with old trucks.

#### PUBLIC COMMENT

Ken Jackson, 2799 Harkney Hill Road, spoke regarding the \$100,000 taken out of the school budget for ROTC, but yet raises for administration were funded. He finds it upsetting that they cut the science packages, but are funding raises. With regard to Oak Haven, he feels that it is clear that this building has to be a school, per contract, and suggested the School Committee reads up on that.

Stacy O’Gorman, 31 Elton Street, asked that Joe and Lisa Piccirilli’s MLS sheet be put on record, as it was advertised as having a “walk to the water”. In addition, the Mohawk Street property is being blocked with shrubs and rocks with unclear boundaries. She read a portion of a letter from the Attorney General to Manager Hoover dated May 13, 2015, as Atty. General Schultz had reviewed the North Road Public Right of Way. He also referred to the lack of boundaries on the East Shore Drive right of way. He further suggested that the Town post appropriate signs and mark the boundaries to encourage public access here.

Ms. O’Gorman commented that the town needs to replace the fence and at least one tree on the Elton Street right of way and she would like to see an ordinance drafted regarding the removal of trees on a public right of way. (Full report is on file in Council folder.)

Richard Reynolds, 501 Village Green Circle, remarked that this over 55 community pays town taxes but does not receive town services such as snow removal or trash removal. The residents have to pay privately. Mr. Reynolds suggested either reducing their taxes since they have to pay for services privately, or keep the taxes the same and have the town take over the services.

Lynn Bergeron, 8 Darius Lane, spoke regarding the 2% pay raises for school administration, yet there are people in town who do not work and are struggling with taxes or are on a fixed income.

Charles Vacca, 124 Fairway Drive, feels it would be a great honor if the greenway is named in memory of Guy Lefebvre. Mr. Vacca feels the town should appoint a study committee to consider taking over the fire districts.

Marc O’Gorman, 31 Elton Street, spoke pertaining to the encroachment agreement between the Town of Coventry and Lori Lanoue, allowing her to maintain a public right of way on Lake Tiogue. That license should be revoked. In addition there is a stairway which he feels could be unsafe, a

retaining wall that could be unsafe, invasive plantings, a sprinkler system on the right of way needs to be removed as well as a pump. He submitted a letter to Manager Hoover from the Department of the Attorney General with regard to the Tiogue Lake right of way issues.

Charlotte Porter, 26 Sandra Circle, reported that the asphalt plants are operating on Sundays with the silos running, a horrible humming noise and offensive odors.

Robert Lawrence, 26 Darton Street, commented that answers are needed on the situation around Tiogue Lake. This has been going on since 2010 and we need answers. Mr. Hoover and Mr. Shibley have not answered one e mail. My sister in law said she is willing to pay to put up a fence and was told that she can't do any construction there, yet another abutter has put up a dock and put a ladder into the water. There is a liability there.

Fred Gralinski, 7 Hawthorne Drive, spoke on the Coventry Fire District's downgraded ISO rating and assured the Council that the board is attending to it.

#### REPORT OF THE CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Nancy Sullivan, Chairwoman of the Citizens Advisory Committee, reported to the Town Council on findings of the Citizens Advisory Committee after their review of the Town Charter since its implementation in 1972 to present.

She explained how the Committee approached the task, and how they reviewed the charters, verified the changes and came to their current consensus that a main cause of concern with the charter is that there is no written procedure to certify the changes. The Committee recommended a procedure to be implemented and made policy. The procedure would be to implement written procedures, as they feel there is no checks and balances procedure for verification of the charter, in order to ensure the accuracy of the Home Rule Charter and that it will not be in question in the future.

In arriving at this consensus, she further explained that the committee reviewed all past charters, recommended charter changes, review the ballots containing the changes, the changes that were approved by the citizens, and the submittal of those changes to the town's code company for final changes.

Councilwoman Duxbury raised the question of how to proceed in making corrections and know that we are working with the correct copy. Mr. Jackson replied that the final copy that General Code has should be official, although he is not sure if they have made the most recent changes yet. Manager Hoover added that Mr. Jackson's color coded copy is very helpful. Between the Manager's Office, the IT Department and Town Clerk, we will work together so we can all be assured we are looking at the correct town charter.

Manager Hoover stated that the Citizens Advisory Committee did a fantastic job on the Charter and has begun working on their next assignment, reviewing the senior tax freeze.

#### RESOLUTIONS

1. Discussion and resulting action on appointing Russell Lacaillade (full member) and Jeanne Kostyla and Irene Drew (alternate members) on the Zoning Board of Review

A motion was made by Councilman McGee seconded by Councilwoman Carlson to approve appointments. All voted aye.

2. Discussion and resulting action on appointing James Sullivan to Pawtuxet River Authority

A motion was made by Councilman Laboissonniere seconded by Councilwoman Duxbury to approve appointment. All voted aye.

3. Discussion and resulting action on back pay for the Clerk of the Municipal Court

Finance Director Thibeault indicated that in 2009 the Town Council changed the wages in the budget for the Municipal Court Clerk, but did not change the ordinance that covers that matter. We concluded that Mr. Boulanger should have been paid the amount shown in the ordinance and has therefore been underpaid from that time until now. He approached me last February and asked me to review and look into it. According to my calculations, he has been underpaid approximately \$18,227.50 since 2009.

Councilman McGee questioned how this could happen, that all of a sudden we are getting hit with six years of payments? Mr. Boulanger must have known the pay when he took the job. Mr. Thibeault said to the best of his knowledge, the budget for the Municipal Court Clerk was reduced from \$9,000+, then subsequently budgeted to receive just approximately \$4,000, which ultimately ended up \$6,100, and that has been determined by looking at prior budgets. However, by ordinance it was never changed and our opinion is that he was underpaid for all of these years.

Manager Hoover said that until Mr. Boulanger brought this to his attention in February, we did not know that this existed. Back in 2009, the Town Council just went and cut the salary without changing the ordinance whatsoever.

Councilwoman Duxbury asked what the budget indicates now, the budget that we just passed for FY 16. Mr. Thibeault replied \$6,100 per year, although the ordinance states \$9,048.

Mrs. Duxbury asked if we can change the ordinance to reflect what is stated in the budget, and where are we supposed to get the money to pay him. Manager Hoover responded that we would use the contingency fund.

Councilman Laboissonniere wondered if at the time the budget was cut, had there been discussions with the clerk, or an agreement to work for less money? How was this done? Or was it just remiss of that council not to adjust or pass a new ordinance?

Councilwoman Duxbury commented that Mr. Boulanger is not only the clerk of Municipal Court but is also the Probate Court Judge, he has two jobs for the town. If we go to Mr. Boulanger, would he be opposed to reducing his pay, especially since he wears two hats. Manager Hoover said that he is not willing to do that. When he took the job it was the upper rate of pay, the ordinance did not change.

Councilwoman Duxbury suggested that we find another judge or court clerk who would be willing to work for that pay.

Manager Hoover indicated that the Probate Judge actually follows the terms of the council elections, you could have replaced him at the last election and you still can. Solicitor Gorham agreed.

Councilwoman Duxbury suggested sitting down and negotiating with him considering that he is taking two paychecks from the town and we have only budgeted \$6,100. If he is not willing to take the lesser amount maybe there is another clerk who will.

Councilman Laboissonniere made motion seconded by Councilwoman Carlson to table this issue for further discussion. All voted aye.

Councilwoman Carlson indicated that she would like to take a look at the ordinance and amend it. Councilman Laboissonniere suggested that Council first review the ordinance.

Manager Hoover added that at the time this was done the tactic that was used was a slash and burn type tactic which he does not care to explain at this time, but that is what happened.

Discussion and resulting action on the reallocation of the FY 2012 Capital Improvement projects

Manager Hoover explained that you can only carry a three year capital improvement program and there were some items left from FY 12. This will revert back to the general fund and no projects will get done if we don't reallocate the money to where we believe we need it. One of the main places we would need funding is in demolishing the so called "dollar building". The building is

decayed and needs to be demolished. We are out to bid now and fortunately we are in negotiations with HUD and the amount of \$29,000 was transferred to us to use for demo as opposed to remodeling. Both Director McGee and I don't believe that is enough money, but we won't know until after bids come in. I believe a good portion of the reallocation should be forwarded toward paying for this in order to get the demo done. It is a condemned building. The total to be reallocated for the demolition at 582 Washington Street is \$64,395, which includes \$26,489 for roof repair at the annex, \$1,406 from parks and recreation and \$9,500 for police vehicles and \$27,000 from the playground project.

A motion was made by Councilman McGee seconded by Councilwoman Duxbury to approve resolution. All voted aye.

Discussion and resulting action on awarding a contract to Custom Container Solutions of Lewisburg, PA for fifteen (15) 40 CY containers at a price of \$4,679 each, for a total cost of \$70,185

DPW Director McGee stated this is part of the bond for automated refuse collection, one of the last two pieces for the automated collection program. We received three bids and recommend the low bidder as they are all qualified.

Mr. Laboissonniere asked if this will take the place of Rambone and whether we will be moving our own stuff to the landfill. Mr. McGee responded that it will take the place of Rambone, as it is part of the bond issue for the automated program. The automated arm trucks will go daily to the landfill. President Shibley asked Mr. McGee if he is comfortable with this bidder, since there is really only a \$5,000 difference between this bid and a Rhode Island company. Mr. McGee said this is the most responsible and lowest bidder, and he is comfortable with that.

A motion was made by Councilwoman Carlson seconded by Councilwoman Duxbury to approve resolution. All voted aye.

Discussion and resulting action on awarding a contract to R.T. Nunes & Sons, Inc. for the replacement of the Island Drive Bridge at a cost of \$379,500

Manager Hoover advised that the money is from the state highway and bridge fund, being done with a low cost loan from Clean Water. It is in this year's program. Last year's was Reservoir Road.

Mr. McGee indicated that five bid invitations were sent out and we only received one bidder. However, Nunes has met all the specific requirements and he recommends that Nunes is awarded the contract for \$379,500.

Manager Hoover explained that the Island Drive Bridge is too low, has plates on it and pretty much quarantines watercraft. This project is set to begin at the drawdown of Johnson's Pond and will take 30-60 days to repair.

Councilwoman Duxbury asked Mr. McGee his opinion on the bid price, since we only received one bid. Mr. McGee indicated that this project had gone out to bid about four years ago, Cardi and Nunes were the only bidders at that time and this bid was substantially close to what it was then.

A motion was made by Councilman McGee seconded by Councilwoman Duxbury to approve resolution. All voted aye.

Discussion and resulting action on awarding a contract to Tom's Truck Sales of Mannassas, VA for a 2005 Mack Roll-Off truck at a cost of \$79,900.

Manager Hoover remarked that these trucks are difficult to find. DPW Director McGee found one in Florida and one in Virginia. This truck is the last piece of the automated program and we budgeted \$100,000 for the truck. Because of the cost, we thought it would be a good idea for Mr. McGee and the chief mechanic to go to Virginia and look at the truck, see if it met their needs and they had some very favorable results. There were only two trucks like this on the east coast, and the truck in Virginia had everything we were looking at a cost of \$79,900, well under the \$100,000 we budgeted.

A motion was made by Councilman Laboissonniere seconded by Councilwoman Carlson to approve resolution. All voted aye.

Discussion and resulting action on awarding a contract to M. Barboza & Sons for the replacement of roofs under the Energy Grant at the Town Hall/Library, Human Services/Senior Center and Town Hall Annex at a total cost of \$1,155,876.90.

Manager Hoover explained that several years ago the citizens approved a \$5 million bond for energy improvements and a major portion of the improvements are the roofs.

DPW Director McGee further explained that this will be funded through the energy grant money and we have about \$1.3 million allocated toward this from the bond. We had inspections, issued bid specs, the same specs were sent to each bidder; there was a prebid meeting and as a result Barboza and Sons was the low bidder on all three buildings. In addition, he has worked for us before in that our insurance company had hired him for repairs, so he is familiar with the building.

The town hall building will be done and so will the annex roof except for the unoccupied area in the northeast corner. Human services will be totally replaced. All skylights will be eliminated. We have another \$191,000 grant that will be utilized from Human Services and still leave us with a \$70,000 buffer in case there are any change orders. All roof drains will also be replaced.

Councilman Laboissonniere asked about the portion of the annex that is not being repaired; Mr. McGee said he would only need about \$150,000 to complete that.

Councilwoman Carlson asked about the discrepancy on the bid amounts; Mr. McGee said it is due to the alternates stated on the bids.

A motion was made by Councilman McGee seconded by Councilwoman Duxbury to approve resolution. All voted aye.

## LICENSES

1. Renewal of 90 day peddler licenses (July 1, 2015 through September 29, 2015) for Palaqis Ice Cream, 55 Bacon St., Pawtucket

A motion was made by Councilman Laboissonniere seconded by Councilman McGee to approve license renewal. All voted aye.

2. Renewal of 90 day peddler licenses (July 1, 2015 through September 29, 2015) for JoJo's Cupcakes, 77 Isle of Capri Road

A motion was made by Councilman Laboissonniere seconded by Councilman McGee to approve license renewal. All voted aye.

3. Renewal of 90 day peddler licenses (July 1, 2015 through September 29, 2015) for RI Organic, 301 Hopkins Hill Road

Manager Hoover has concerns about renewal of this license. Originally when it was granted the zoning officer questioned the availability of parking at that location. We have received several complaints regarding blockage of areas along Hopkins Hill Road. Chief Volpe advised that he has received only one complaint and by the time the officers got to the location there were only a few cars and the blockage couldn't be determined. He thinks perhaps there could be a problem with people pulling out of the condos across the street onto Hopkins Hill Road.

Manager Hoover added that originally, the applicant stated that if parking became an issue, she would be willing to accommodate parking on her property. He then asked Planning Director Paul Sprague to contact the applicant to see if the parking situation can be improved.

Councilwoman Duxbury added that she has also received phone calls and e mails, primarily from residents of the Highlands condos, trying to exit. She suggested that maybe as an alternative, parking should be prohibited right there by the intersection. She does believe there is an issue with parking and an alternative should be considered.

Manager Hoover asked that if Council approves this license renewal, that it is approved conditionally; the license won't be renewed until Planning tells the Town Clerk that all is ok. If the applicant does not comply with what Planning would like to see, then he suggested that the clerk does not issue the license.

President Shibley travels Hopkins Hill Road frequently, never sees too many cars there, and has only seen them on the same side as the applicant's house. However, he agrees that if we are getting calls and e mails, there must be some kind of a problem.

A motion was made by Councilman McGee seconded by Councilwoman Duxbury to approve license pending the Planning Department looking into the problem, and to issue the renewal license based on the recommendation of the Planning Department with regard to parking. All voted aye.

4. Application for Class F license by Greene Public Library Association for a fundraiser on June 25, 2015

Councilwoman Carlson explained that this is a fund raising event for a long time Greene resident who is ill.

A motion was made by Councilwoman Carlson seconded by Councilman Laboissonniere to approve issuance of a Class F license. All voted aye.

A motion was made by Councilwoman Carlson seconded by Councilman Laboissonniere to waive fee for license. All voted aye.

5. Consideration on granting a Large Event Permit from the Coventry Police Department to Jeff Sanocki at 375 Hopkins Hill Road for a scheduled wedding on August 22, 2015

Chief Volpe indicated that everything is in order with regard to the wedding event, but it appears they will be selling alcohol through a private vendor. However, at this time it is uncertain as to what type of liquor license is needed, we need to do some research, so they will have to come back before council for a liquor license.

Councilman Laboissonniere questioned whether the caterer has a liquor license. Chief will look into further.

A motion was made by Councilman Laboissonniere seconded by Councilman McGee to table license at this time. All voted aye.

PUBLIC HEARING

1. Adopting the regulation and licensure of massage parlors, body works service providers and other such activities under authority provided to the Town of Coventry pursuant to RIGL 45-6-1

A motion was made by Councilman McGee seconded by Councilwoman Carlson to open public hearing. All voted aye.

Solicitor Gorham advised that this ordinance arose as a result of current events in Coventry. The ordinance is basically a copy of Providence's ordinance with some minor modifications conforming it to Coventry, but 95% of it is the Providence ordinance. The reason is just to protect the public safety, and enable the police to enforce it.

Councilwoman Duxbury added that the ordinance does not require anything additional for licensed message therapists, physicians, chiropractors, anyone already licensed by the state. We want to hold these businesses to certain standards, which includes keeping themselves clothed.

Councilman McGee raised the issue of closing time and doesn't think it is reasonable to close by 8:00 p.m., as there are people who don't get out of work that early. He suggested changing close time to 9 p.m. or 10 p.m.
